Rabbi Sid Schwarz was the founder of PANIM: The Institute for Jewish Leadership and Values and led it for 21 years. He previously served as executive director of the Jewish Community Council of Greater Washington, D.C. and was the founding rabbi of Adat Shalom Reconstructionist Congregation in Rockville, MD. In 2002, Rabbi Schwarz was the recipient of the Covenant Award for his singular contributions to Jewish education. In 2007 Newsweek magazine named Sid one of the fifty most influential rabbis in America. He is the author of *Finding a Spiritual Home: How a New Generation of American Jews can Transform the American Synagogue* (2000), and *Judaism and Justice: The Jewish Passion to Repair the World* (Jewish Lights, 2006).

Linda Klonsky is an organization development consultant with over 20 years of experience working with non profits, primarily in the Jewish community. She served as the director of consulting for Synagogue 2000, and was also on the staff of both the Baltimore and Washington Jewish federations. A qualified practitioner of the Myers Briggs Type Indicator, Linda has a certificate in leadership education from the John F. Kennedy School of Government at Harvard University and a certificate in Change Management from Johns Hopkins University.



Dr. Erica Brown is the director of adult education for the Partnership for Jewish Life and Learning and scholar in residence at the Jewish Federation of Greater Washington. She is the author of *Inspired Jewish Leadership: Practical Approaches to Building Strong Communities* (2008), *The Case for Jewish Peoplehood: Can we be One?* (2008) and the forthcoming *Spiritual Boredom*.
